Harvard/Radcliffe Students for Choice **Draft Constitution**

I. Purpose

e be momed Horo Harvard/Radcliffe Students for Choice is an organization devoted to protecting and extending reproductive freedom. We believe that all women have the right to choose a safe and legal abortion, and that all people have the right to use any form of birth control. We oppose all efforts to limit reproductive freedom. We believe that all women, regardless of age or income, must be guaranteed access to abortion.

II. Membership

Membership in Harvard/Radcliffe Students for Choice is open to all registered students at Harvard/Radcliffe who share our belief in reproductive freedom, regardless of race, color, creed, gender, sexual orientation, nationality, age, or physical capacity.

III. Committees

A. The work of the group will be carried out largely in committees. Any group of two or more members may form a committee. Membership in any committee is open to any group member who attends at least half of the committee's meetings.

B. The group's committees must include a steering committee, charged with coordinating the group's activities and formulating its goals, and a finance committee, AAC charged with budgeting and fund-raising. The steering and finance committees will consist of

all interested group members who attend at least half of the committee's meetings.

C. Each committee will determine its own internal structure and its own agenda. Harvard/Radcliffe Students for Choice has no power to dissolve any committee or to block the action of any committee, but it may, by majority vote of the group or by two-thirds vote of the steering committee, withhold endorsement of any committee's activities, in which case the committee is prohibited from using the name "Harvard/Radcliffe Students for Choice" in conjunction with the un-endorsed activities.

IY. Meetings

A. General meetings shall be held from time to time when called by the steering committee. All members of the group should be notified of all general meetings. A simple majority will constitute a quorum, and each member will have one vote. All meetings will be held in rooms which are wheelchair accessible.

B. Committees will decide independently the time and place of their meetings. The

steering committee will meet at least twice monthly during the academic year.

Y. Elections


The group shall elect a coordinator who will serve as a contact person and chair general meetings. The coordinator must be a member of the steering committee. Elections shall be held when called by the steering committee, or when called for by a two-thirds vote of the group. All members of the group may vote at elections, which must be held at a general meeting.

YI. Amendments

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds yote at a general meeting.

International Women's Day - March 8, 1989

Daybreak's by-laws, filed with the public charities division of the Attorney General's office, state: "We will never advise, or in any way assist with, the killing of an unborn child unless it is a necessary part of saving the mother's life."

Bon, now 30, says the clinic would not give her the results of a urine test over the telephone. When she went to the clinic to get the results, she claims she was not told immediately whether she

was pregnant. Instead, B alleges, she was escorted into a room with two women who questioned her about her personal life, sexual activity and religious beliefs. "They used a lot of psychological pressure to try to persuade me that if I were pregnant (which was) I should not have an abortion. They said something like: 'God wants you to have this baby.

'I felt as though I had been tricked by the promise of a free pregnancy test. This was the means by which they got me to agree to a free 'counseling' session," B claims in her complaint.

Winter Clothing

Insulated jackets of down, polyguard, or thinsulate are best. Down is useless when wet but extremely light and warm when dry. Hats conserve body heat. Gloves and mittens are a must.

Protect yourself from the wind. Windproof hooded garments of uncoated nylon or Goretex are necessary to prevent heat loss. Rain gear can serve as wind gear, but wind gear cannot double as rain gear (except for Goretex).

Rain and snow- Ponchos are fine unless there is wind or the rain is heavy; then they're useless. Under these conditions you need a coated nylon rain parks or full length anorak called a cagoule. All rain and wind gear should be full cut to leave room to wear layers of clothing underneath. Hoods are really necessary.

If you get wet and cold, you are headed for trouble...hypothermia. Cotton absorbs water and loses its insulating properties. Wet cotton will wick heat away from your skin. Wool, polyester (pile or bunting) or polypropylene garments will keep you warm even when wet.

Hypothermia

Hypothermia is the lowering of an individual's internal body temperature. Since humans are warm-blooded creatures they require a constant body temperature to survive. The body maintains its core temperature constant by controlling heat production and heat loss. There is a part of the brain called the hypothalmus which regulates these two functions. When the human body is subject to conditions which decrease heat production or increase heat loss beyond what the hypothalmus can control then hypothermia results.

Prevention of hypothermia:

Prevention of hypothermia involves preventing heat loss, encouraging heat production, and detecting emerging illness early.

*Control Evaporation

Regulate clothing layers to prevent sweating.

Cover the nose and mouth with wool.

*Control Convection & Conduction

Cover bare skin, head, neck, and hands.

Wear clothing that does not absorb water (avoid cotton).

Heat production can be encouraged in several ways:

*Eat food rich in calories (avoid diet foods).

*Eat warm food and drink warm beverages.

*If possible, keep moving and exercising.

Do's and Don'ts

Clothing- wear pants, slacks, sneakers, durable boots. Warm clothing. Hats, mittens, gloves etc... Cover face with wool scarf. Be as identifiably Pro-Choice as possible (buttons, sweat shirts). Do not wear jewelry (earrings, necklaces, watches may get ripped off). Do not bring purses or napsacks with you to the clinics. Waist belts are good.

Stay alert- watch crowd movement e.g. specific OR people, clumps of sign holders, potential clients. Monitor the noise level of the crowd.

Never act alone never act alone. Groups of two or more. Don't run. Running escalates.

Don't speak to OR- Never speak to OR. Hold your tongue.

Do's and Don'ts as Coordinator

- 1. Check-in with the clinic- hours, numbers of clients etc.
- 2. Introduce self to police officer in charge
- 3. Assign responsibilities to facilitators
 - -Escorts
 - -client spotters
 - -sign visability
 - -wall/buffer zone people
 - -orbiter
- 4. Check-in with office repeatedly
- 5. Wrap-up (announcements)
- 6. Check-in with Beth at end of day.

Other:

Media- whenever someone from the media arrives at a clinic, the office must be notified immediately and the media spokesperson (Ellen Zucker) must be alerted.

Arrests- if the police arrest any Pro-Choice people the office must be notified immediately.





MOTHERS AND OTHERS:

A CABARET ABOUT ABORTION RIGHTS AND CHOICE

In response to the Supreme Court's decision to reconsider Roe v. Wade, Underground Railway Theater revives MOTHERS AND OTHERS, a cabaret about choice, abortion rights, and women's control over their bodies and lives.

In a matter of months, the abortion rights issue has taken center stage in the public consciousness. It is very possible, some say inevitable, that the momentous Roe vs. Wade decision will be reversed or severely altered. Dialogue between the "pro-choice" and "pro-life" groups has virtually ended; slogans and chants have replaced debate while groups such as "Operation Rescue" have begun to physically infringe upon a woman's right to choose an abortion.


MOTHERS AND OTHERS is a one-woman cabaret theater piece designed by URT co-director Debra Wise to provoke thought and discussion about abortion rights, taking the position that no choice is easy or obvious. In this collage of docu-drama, comedy, poetry, and song, women tell of the tangled web of roles, values, and choices that make up their lives. One character celebrates the wonder and joy of motherhood, while simultaneously wondering if she is losing her mind, creativity, and self. With a deep understanding of the choices and challenges involved, she chooses to have a second child. In another scene (taken from a 1971 courtroom transcript), an abortion "trial" highlights how the rhetoric of the abortion issue has obscured women's traumatic experiences of illegal operations and ignored the difficulties that any choice entails.

Drawing from such diverse sources as Anne Sexton, Billy Holiday, Kate Millet, and Adrienne Rich, the cabaret encourages people of diverse backgounds to understand complex issues. The cabaret also features an "interview the audience" segment that invites people in an anonymous and enjoyable way to relate these women's choices to their own. In 1988, the show was featured at the National Women in Theater Festival in Boston. This 75-minute program may be performed in small theaters, clubs, and coffeehouses with a minimum of technical requirements. Music provided by the accompanist before the show and informal discussion with the actress afterwards makes a full evening. Workshops related to the play also available.

Clinic doctor's record shows sexual misconduct

HYANNIS — The gynecologist who plans to perform the Cape's first elective abortions was disciplined for sexual misconduct in 1984 by the state Board of Registration in Medicine.

Dr. Howard J. Silverman, owner of the medical office WomanCare and a counseling service, Choices, was placed on probation by the board for three years, from 1984 to 1987, according to Trice Atchison, spokeswoman for the board. She confirmed that the issue was sexual misconduct but said she did not have immediate access to a document with details of the charge.

The incident involved a young female patient referred to Silverman by Children's Hospital in Boston, according to a board document obtained by an anti-abortion group. While treating the patient in his private practice, on two separate occasions, Silverman "placed his mouth on the patient's breasts for several minutes," the document states.

The document was given to the Cape Cod Times by members of Massachusetts Citizens for Life of Cape Cod who picketed outside the doctor's office on Camp Street in Hyannis yesterday.

Attempts to reach Silverman for comment were unsuccessful.

Silverman also owns Repro Associates in Brookline and Womancare in New Bedford. On the Cape, he has

owned Choices since it opened in 1985, said Marilyn Turner, director of the counseling and referral agency.

the counseling and referral agency.
Choices has merged with Woman-Care, Silverman's medical office providing gynecological services and abortions. The two now operate out of the Camp Street location.

Ms. Turner, who has worked for Silverman for seven years, said she was not aware of the displinary action against him.

"I suppose if one dug enough one could dig up something on any doctor or town official," Ms. Turner said.

Ms. Turner said a nurse practitioner, not Silverman, does many of the routine gynecological examinations.'

According to the Board of Registration in Medicine document, Silverman's patient reported the sexual misconduct to staff at Children's Hospital and, when confronted by the hospital's attorney, Silverman admitted the incidents occurred.

As a result of the incidents, Silverman's privileges were suspended by Brigham and Women's Hospital, Newton-Wellesley Hospital, New England Baptist Hospital, and, by mutual agreement, at Children's Hospital, according to the state document. He currently has privileges at Hahnemann Hospital in Brighton.

The document states that Silverman's conduct violated a section of

The document states that Silverman's conduct violated a section of state law dealing with "gross misconduct" and another section dealing with "practicing medicine while the ability to practice medicine is impaired by mental instability."

The specific terms of his probation

were not available either, but Ms. Atchison said it probably included some kind of monitoring or supervision of his practice.

Meanwhile, Doreen Marinelli of Sandwich, a member of the antiabortion group Massachusetts Citizens for Life of Cape Cod, said the group would picket "peacefully" outside WomenCare at least one day each week. About 35 protesters and 15 children, mostly infants and toddlers, were at the scene yesterday.

The group also plans to offer "sidewalk counseling" on abortion alternatives to those women going to Silverman for abortions, Mrs. Marinelli said.

Choices provides counseling on all three pregnancy options — keeping a baby, adoption and abortion — to its clients, Ms. Turner said. The agency does about 2,000 pregnancy tests a year, she said. For the past two years, about 60 percent of those pregnant opted to continue their pregnancies, while 40 percent chose to terminate them, she said.

Ms. Turner said that no one canceled an appointment yesterday because of the picket.

"I have to say deep in my heart I believe in their right to be out there picketing," Ms. Turner said. "I'm not saying that I think it's wonderful that they're out there and we want them there, but they have a right to

be there.

"Once they come onto our property, however, they will be arrested, because this is private property," she said.

that may result in a decision this summer that could revise or scrap the landmark 1973 Roe vs. Wade ruling that legalized abortion. Such a ruling could again give the states jurisdiction over the abortion issue.

Even if the court leaves Roe vs. Wade intact, many abortion-rights advocates said yesterday they believe the decision would be a temporary one. Nikki Nichols Gamble, director of the Planned Parenthood League of Massachusetts, said President Bush will probably appoint more antiabortionists to the court in the future, virtually ensuring the overturning of Roe vs. Wade.

"I think there's going to be hundreds of votes like this over the next two years," Gamble said.

The debate yesterday was emotional on both sides. Doris, illustrating his belief that life begins at conception, told the story of how his wife had a miscarriage 30

years ago. He said he looked at what remained of the fetus and saw nothing but a bit of blood. He took the remains to the hospital and was told by the doctor that, had the baby lived, it would have been a boy. "That's where I come from on the issue," Doris said.

Roe vs. Wade blasted

Sen. Edward Kirby (R-Whitman), who voted in favor of the resolution, said abortion was a form of murder. He blasted Roe vs. Wade as part of an out-of-control trend in America toward free choice in everything, including drugs, sexual orientation and sex.

"Don't encourage our society to hurt itself through freedom of choice," Kirby said, citing young girls who have gotten pregnant because society has told them, "if it feels good, that's OK, do it."

Opponents of the measure focused on a woman's right to choose whether she wants an abortion and the privacy of that decision.

Sen. William Golden (D-Weymouth) said government has no role in making abortion decisions. He said barring abortions will not stop them, only prevent access to medical care for the poor. "This resolution won't stop abortions any more than Roe vs. Wade mandated abortions," Golden said.



What is Roe v. Wade?

In this 1973 landmark case, the Supreme Court ruled that the decision to have an abortion during the first trimester of pregnancy must be left entirely to the woman and her physician, and that the only reason a state can regulate abortion during the second trimester is to protect the woman's health.

What is the Hyde Amendment?

Prior to 1977 Medicaid funding—a joint federal-state program that pays for medical care for families of very low income—paid the medical fees for approximately 20% of women obtaining abortions in the U.S. In 1977, the Supreme Court ruled that states did not have to fund what they considered "medically unnecessary" (varies from state to state) abortions. Currently, fewer than half of the states pay for abortions for women who became pregnant by rape or incest and/or who have identified that the fetus has severe defects. Only thirteen states pay for abortions in all or most circumstances.

It is interesting to note that Medicaid funding for sterilization remains available. It seems no coincidence that when the Illinois government cut funding for Medicaid abortions in 1980, the number of government-funded sterilizations doubled in the state. Lack of abortion availability to poor women and women of color compounds sterilizationabuse.

What is Webster v. Reproductive Health Services?

The July 3, 1989 Supreme Court decision 1) Upheld the Missouri law's prohibition on the use of public facilities (or private facilities on public land) and public employees to perform abortions, even if the abortion itself is privately funded. 2) Upheld the provision requiring that a physician must perform viability tests on a fetus s/he has "reason to believe" is at least twenty weeks old. 3) Found that a provision of the Missouri state law declaring that "the life of each human being begins at conception" simply expresses a value judgement and does not interfere with or regulate abortion decisions.

What does this mean in practical terms?

• The prohibition of the use of public employees/public facilities leaves a woman with fewer choices. As Justice Harry A. Blackmun wrote, there may be no choice at all for a woman "too sick or too poor to travel."

 Forcing doctors to perform fetus viability tests increases the cost of an abortion and will perhaps make it difficult if not impossible to obtain a lawful abortion if there

is a chance that the fetus could survive outside the womb.

• The near-overruling of *Roe v. Wade* will encourage more test cases in the area, and, and Justice Blackmun wrote, "implicitly invites every state legislature to enact more and more restrictive abortion regulations in order to provoke more and more test cases in the hope that sometime down the line the court will return the law of procreative freedom to the severe limitations that prevailed" prior to *Roe v. Wade*

- What is upcoming?
 Terrock v. Ragsdale involves a series of Illinois statues and regulations that, like the law in Webster interfere with women's access to abortion services. The laws require that all facilities that perform abortions must comply with structural, equipment, and staffing requirements that the Illinois District Court and U.S. Court of Appeals found to be unrelated to the performance of safe abortions but which would necessitate the huge expense of constructing "the functional equivalent of small hospitals." Also involved is a statue preventing anyone with "financial interest" in the decision (i.e., the doctor) from providing abortion counseling, thus effectively raising costs even further.
- Ohio v. Akron Center for Reproductive Health involves a law that requires a physician to give 24 hours notice to a minor's parent/guardian prior to the abortion procedure. Notification only be avoided through a "judicial bypass procedure" in which a minor must convince the court that she is mature enough to make the decision. This procedure has been ruled unconstitutional by the U.S. Court of Appeals because it is extremely difficult to implement, does not protect the minor's anonymity, and results in dangerous delays of up to 22 days. The state argues that the procedure is adequate and that it need not provide any bypass at all, even for cases of incest or minors suffering physical abuse.
- Hodgsen v. Minnesota involves a law that requires a minor to notify both parents prior to an abortion, even if they are divorced or never married or even if one parent objects to the notification of the other. It makes no exceptions for noncustodial parents who have never met the minor or who have been barred by protective order from visiting her. Abortion is prohibited until 48 hours after notice has been given, which has resulted in significant delays and a rise in secondtrimesterabortions.

BOSTON NOW SUMMARY OF FEMINIST VOTING RECORDS

Listed below are the elected officials from Massachusetts and a sampling of their stands on women's issues. Please write to your legislator and express your appreciation of or disappointment in her/his public position on these issues.

The abortion rights record is based on a vote taken on a 1988 bill designed to restrict a minor's access to abortion. Many legislators who typically vote pro-choice received a negative mark because they supported this bill which would allow for parental involvement in judicial procedures for minors seeking abortion.

The Lesbian and Gay Civil Rights Bill has been reintroduced for the 16th time in the Massachusetts Legislature. The House vote shown here is from March 29, 1989, when the bill passed through the House with a vote of 75 - 72 (13 not voting). The Senate record reflects votes taken both in 1987 and 1988.

The UP AND OUT OF POVERTY votes were taken in both the House and the Senate as part of the UP AND OUT OF POVERTY Campaign strategy to raise the benefit level for recipients of Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC). In the Senate, the last vote taken on the Up To Poverty Bill was in 1986. The House votes shown here were taken in 1989 on the following amendments:

Vote 1 = 6% COLA (Cost of Living Allowance), \$10 Rent Supplement Vote 2 = Survival Package (increase benefits up to poverty level), no COLA, \$20 Rent Supp.

The anti-abortion resolution came before the Senate in late May of 1989. The Senate defeated the proposed resolution (23 - 16) that would have supported a "life begins at conception" theory. We have listed a pro-choice vote as a "+" for consistency.

NATIONAL MOBILIZATION FOR WOMEN'S LIVES CAMPUS ORGANIZING TIPS

SET GOALS FOR DELEGATIONS AND MOBILIZERS

Set them HIGH and get creative about how you are going to achieve them. A delegation is twenty or more mobilizers who will carry a banner identifying their group. Your campus may choose to mobilize as a single delegation (many organizational delegations will be several hundred strong) or you may choose to have several delegations from various groups on campus. Don't overlook other divisions of your University-Graduate Programs, Professional Schools, unions, faculty.

ESTABLISH AN ORGANIZING COMMITTEE

Plan an informational Mobilization planning meeting on campus to discuss the purpose of the Mobilization and to strategize for mobilizing your campus. Invite everyone!! Put up notices around campus, call every campus organization and supportive faculty and administrators. Continue recruiting volunteers: there is work for everyone.

PRICE AND RESERVE BUSES

Call several firms to get the best bid, and find out arrangements on deposits and final payment. Check out the possibility of using campus buses, vans or vehicles. To get firm commitments, it's a good idea to get bus tickets printed to sell. Price the tickets above cost to cover scholarships and no-shows. It may be a good idea to have a bus coordinator for each bus or for every two or three buses. Regardless of how you come - bus, car or van - it's great to travel caravan style. Put signs in the window of the vehicle saying where you're going and why.

TABLES, LEAFLETS AND POSTERS

Set up tables in places where student organizations on campus usually congregate to pass out information. Students are used to checking here for news of "what's happening". Additionally, try other highly visible and heavily trafficked locations such as the cafeteria, library, and student union. Have lots of information to pass out, sign-up sheets for organizing activities and tickets to sell.

Put up posters or flyers around campus. Be prepared to re-post every week. Make sure the posters and leaflets are always up in high traffic areas like student unions and libraries and in every dorm, by the mailboxes, and near vending machines.

Pass out leaflets or flyers at any events you feel are appropriate. Leaflet at campus-wide events and target specific events connected with women's rights, or speakers and films sponsored by political women's groups on campus.

SPREADING THE WORD

The key words for organizing are "personal contact". Talk up the Mobilization at every opportunity...to friends at lunch, to classes, to organizations and groups. Your goal is to make this Mobilization an event that no one would miss. Send speakers to campus organizations and classes to promote the Mobilization and urge participation. Use the enclosed fact sheets and do some additional research so you can speak to classes on the topics of abortion and birth control, and the Equal Rights Amedment.

Arrange to have, or coordinate with any pro-choice speakers who are coming to campus. Organize a pro-choice rally with student and faculty speakers to hype the Mobilization. Representatives from NOW are available for speeches, workshops and rallies.


PUBLICITY

Write letters in your school newspapers; have feature articles written about the organizing effort on campus and coverage of a speech or rally for the Mobilization. Have notices placed in Alumnae publications. Send notices to local and college radio stations to announce next campus organizing meetings, ticket information and promotion of the Mobilization.

OUTREACH TO ORGANIZATIONS

Look for active groups who would tend to be supportive of the Mobilization. Contact each group and ask to speak at their next meeting. If appropriate, ask groups to pass endorsing resolutions - but...







On October 3, 1977, Rosie Jiménez died of a back alley abortion. Her death could have been avoided; but Congress had passed the Hyde Amendment, which denies women federal funding for abortions. Rosie died because she did not have access to a funded, safe and legal abortion.

Rosie Jiménez was the first known victim of the Hyde Amendment. She was not the last. The conditions that forced her to her death still threaten many women's lives - especially the lives of poor women, young women, and women of color.

- The Supreme Court has attacked the abortion rights of all women. Their decisions seek to put further dangerous restrictions on a woman's right to choose abortion. On the streets, "Operation Rescue" terrorizes women seeking abortions. Clinics are bombed and blockaded.
- . The state and federal governments have cut funds for pre-natal care, child care, programs for children and families, AIDS prevention and treatment, universal health care, and drug prevention and treatment.
- · Funding cuts threaten Boston City Hospital, the primary health care provider for Boston's low income community.



What is the National Mobilization for Women's Lives?

On Sunday, November 12, 1989, hundreds of thousands of women and men who believe in free choice and equality will rally in Washington, D.C., to voice their conviction that all women have the right to choose a safe and legal abortion. This protest, sponsored by the National Organization for Women, will send a clear message to our government that the pro-choice majority will not stand silently by while our rights are stripped away.

Why is this march so important?

The Supreme Court's July decision in Webster v. Reproductive Services, which allows states to restrict a woman's access to abortion, is a threatening omen for defenders of choice in America. Roe v. Wade, the 1973 landmark case which at last established abortion as a constitutional right, is under serious attack by the courts, the administration, and the state and federal legislatures. Supreme Court cases scheduled for this fall may further limit our freedom to control our bodies. By marching on Washington, we will make it clear to our government that abortion is a national issue, and that we will not allow our most fundamental rights to be subject to the whims of state legislators. We now face the most serious threat to free choice in the sixteen years since Roe v. Wade. We must act now because tomorrow may be too late!

How can I defend my right to choose?

The Harvard/Radcliffe Students for Choice have arranged for busses to transport the Harvard contingent to Washington and back. The busses will leave at 8:30 p.m. on Saturday, November 11, and are expected to return around 3 or 4 a.m. on Monday, November 13. Round-trip tickets will be sold for \$40 in the Harvard dining halls and elsewhere; reduced price tickets may be available for those with financial need. If you are interested in helping to organize the Harvard contingent to the march on Washington, we need your ability and enthusiasm! Let us show the nation that the students, faculty and employees of Harvard/Radcliffe are committed to choice.

GENERAL INFORMATION SHEET - FRIDAY BUSES

This information sheet will provide you with all the information you need to get work the clinic defense on Saturday and get around Washington on Mobilization Day - including a map of D.C. If you loose it r have any questions, please seek out a representative of Boston N.O.W. wearing a red arm band. If you do not see one in your immediate vicinity, look for the red and black balloons carried by the Boston Delegation.

- ON THE BUS: There are two bus captains assigned to each bus. Please note the name of your bus captain and your bus number. Bus captains will send around a sign-up sheet which you must sign. There is a restroom on each bus for your convenience and there will be one stop made during the trip for you to purchase food and stretch your legs. If you have questions that are not answered by this information sheet, please direct them to your bus captains.
- ARRIVAL: The buses departing from the Boston N.O.W. offices at 7pm on Friday night will arrive at Planned Parenthood at 5 am on Saturday. You will be going straight to Clinic Defense. Your bus captain will provide you with the details of clinic defense assignments as well as how to deal with transportation to the clinics and your luggage.
- THE MOBILIZATION: People are asked to gather at the Lincoln Memorial between 11 am and 12 noon. The Rally will be held from 12 noon until 4:30 pm. Look for red and black helium baloons. You will find the Boston delegation below them.
- GETTING HOME AGAIN: You must take the metro to RFK Stadium and board your bus by 7pm. You should take either the Metro Orange Line towards New Carrolton or the Blue Line towards Addison Road from the Smithsonian stop. Get off at the Stadium/Armory Stop (6 stops). RFK Stadium is at this stop. Please leave yourself plenty of time to get on the Metro and to find your bus. The Metro may be crowded as alot of people will be trying to get back to RFK. Someone from Boston N.O.W. will be at a table in the parking lot and will assist you in locating your bus. Look for the Boston N.O.W. banner or red and black balloons. The buses will leave promptly, so it is very important for your bus captain to have your name. If you are not on the list you may be left behind.

What is the National Mobilization for Women's Lives?

On Sunday, November 12, 1989, hundreds of thousands of women and men who believe in free choice and equality will rally in Washington, D.C., to voice their conviction that all women have the right to choose a safe and legal abortion. This protest, sponsored by the National Organization for Women, will send a clear message to our government that the pro-choice majority will not stand silently by while our rights are stripped away.

Why is this march so important?

The Supreme Court's July decision in Webster v. Reproductive Services, which allows states to restrict a woman's access to abortion, is a threatening omen for defenders of choice in America. Roe v. Wade, the 1973 landmark case which at last established abortion as a constitutional right, is under serious attack by the courts, the administration, and the state and federal legislatures. Supreme Court cases scheduled for this fall may further limit our freedom to control our bodies. By marching on Washington, we will make it clear to our government that abortion is a national issue, and that we will not allow our most fundamental rights to be subject to the whims of state legislators. We now face the most serious threat to free choice in the sixteen years since Roe v. Wade. We must act now because tomorrow may be too late!

How can I defend my right to choose?

The Harvard/Radcliffe Students for Choice have arranged for busses to transport the Harvard contingent to Washington and back. The busses will leave at 8:30 p.m. on Saturday, November 11, and are expected to return around 3 or 4 a.m. on Monday, November 13. Round-trip tickets will be sold for \$40 in the Harvard dining halls and elsewhere; reduced price tickets may be available for those with financial need. If you are interested in helping to organize the Harvard contingent to the march on Washington, we need your ability and enthusiasm! Let us show the nation that the students, faculty and employees of Harvard/Radcliffe are committed to choice.
