### Penny Singleton Adds Glamour to Red Feather Drive

In Los Angeles on official business last week, T. E. Shea, our Vice-President and General Manager, assisted Community Chest Campaign Chairman H. J. Wallis in arranging for Penny Singleton's visit to Sandia Oct. 6 to speak at our Red Feather rally.

Governor Edwin L. Mechem and Movie Actress Penny Singleton will take part in the big Red Feather rally to be held in the Base Gymnasium Monday afternoon, Oct. 6. Attending the meeting will be more than 600 Sandia Corporation employees who make up the fund campaign team, representatives of the AEC, Sandia Base and the Albuquerque Community Chest.

The meeting will be held the day before the kickoff of the campaign in Albuquerque which will seek to raise \$230,000 to finance the work of 21 participating agencies during the coming year. Our drive will be completed within two days except for the final clean-up to include those absent on Oct. 7 and 8.

#### Meeting to Be Broadcast

Governor Mechem and Miss Singleton will arrive at the Gym just before the meeting at 3:30 p.m. A portion of the meeting will be broadcast by KOAT and will be transcribed for use by other stations later in the evening. The "Sandialiers," a group of men singers from Sandia under the direction of Terry Riffin, will open the meeting with a selection after which Dr. R. P. Petersen, chairman of the meeting, will introduce H. J. Wallis, chairman of our Community Chest Committee.

Others to take part in the program will be Donald A. Quarles, president of Sandia Corporation, C. W. Eggert and K. C. Shinn, members of the Community Chest Committee and presidents of the two unions representing Sandia employees.

We are indebted to RKO Radio Pictures, Inc., for their cooperation in making possible Penny Singleton's visit to Albuquerque at no cost to the Community Chest campaign. While here she will also visit Sandia Base hospital, the Veterans Hospital, and if time permits, St. Anthony's Orphanage.

The meeting will adjourn at 4:45.

#### Leaders to Report

Throughout the Laboratory area brief meetings will be held on the morning of Oct. 7 to give employees a chance to hear reports by the 30 solicitation squad leaders who earlier this week toured the agencies of the Community Chest to obtain first-hand information about their work and needs.

The booth will serve as a turn-in point for the team captains on the second day of the drive and a chart will be posted to show the progress of the solicitation by teams.

### Harold Barr Will Present Paper to Engineer Meeting

Harold C. Barr, division supervisor of 5216, will present a paper, "Use of High Speed Photography in Field Testing" at the Oct. 5-11 symposium sponsored by the Society of Motion Picture and Television Engineers in Washington, D.C.

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the industrial use of high speed motion picture photography and the meeting celebrates the occasion with the symposium which is international in scope. Engineers from all over the world will attend.

Mr. Barr will also serve as chairman on one day for the Symposium on High Speed, and as a member of the Society's Engineering Committee on High Speed Photography he will participate in discussions of that group in connection with recommended practices for the industry. Wallace C. Eder, a member of the administrative division of 2451, recently was awarded the Bronze Star by the Secretary of the Army.

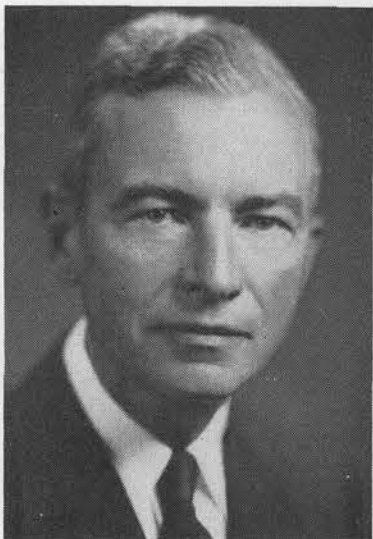
The honor, addressed to Capt. Wallace C. Eder, Inf., USAR, cited his "exemplary conduct in ground combat against the armed enemy while assigned as first lieutenant, 149th Inf. Reg., about Feb. 1, 1945, Pacific Theater of Operations."

Previous to World War II he was an agronomist with the Soil Conservation Program in Arizona and New Mexico and worked briefly in that capacity after leaving the army. 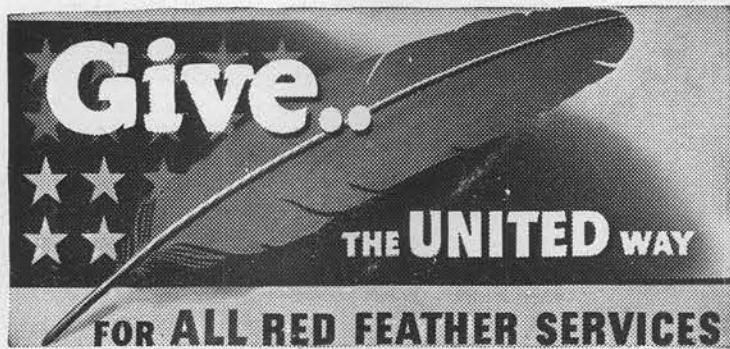

## Boom Town, USA—Your Stake in Albuquerque...

The City of Albuquerque, one of the fastest growing communities of the nation, is finding that there's a lot of truth in the ancient maxim, "All that glitters is not gold." Practically bursting at the seams with a tremendous influx of new citizens, the city is faced with many serious problems in expanding its facilities to accommodate the growing population. These physical facilities will eventually be provided, and meanwhile we are all prepared to make the best of it. But what of the human problems presented by this rapid growth?

Between 1940 and 1950 the growth of Albuquerque was greater than that of any of the country's 165 metropolitan areas, according to official census figures. The population of Bernalillo county more than doubled and the City of Albuquerque registered a population gain of 173 per cent—almost triple the 1940 population. Most of this growth actually occurred in the postwar years, since the population of the state was somewhat depleted during the war. In the two years since the census was completed the influx of people has continued at an even more rapid rate. Our own growth here at Sandia is indicative of what has been happening in the county. There are at least 60,000 more people in Albuquerque than there were in 1945.

All of this brings us to the problems being faced this year by the Albuquerque Community Chest. Is it any wonder that the fund goal has had to be increased by 20% over 1951? Much of the increase can be attributed to rising expenses, but each of the 21 agencies supported by your Red Feather contributions has a much bigger job to do in serving a bigger population—a population with a great many problems of adjustment and human need which are not so prevalent in an older and more stable community.

These human needs—for youth guidance, help for the handicapped, care for orphans, assistance to travelers, recreational facilities for men and women in the Armed Forces, food, shelter and clothing for those temporarily in need—these things cannot wait. The needs must be met NOW, or the human misery and distress will be compounded, lives will be blighted, hopes will be shattered and faith destroyed in those who look to the Community Chest agencies for temporary assistance.

Most of all, if we fail to meet the financial needs of the Red Feather agencies serving our community we will have shirked an obligation to our own families. We have an obligation to them to make our town a healthy and happy place in which to live and no thinking person can be happy with his own good fortune if there are others less fortunate who desperately need the assistance he can give so easily and conveniently through the Community Chest. The foundation we place today under this great new City of Albuquerque will be the base upon which our own children will build its future. We must not allow that foundation to become weakened by the disastrous decay of civic pride and responsibility.

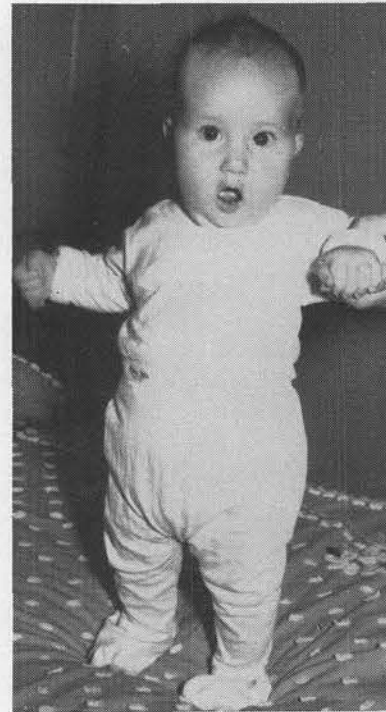

While Queento Vandi, 1932-2, and his family are enjoying their vacation they will visit relatives in Iowa. They also hope to attend a big league game in New York.

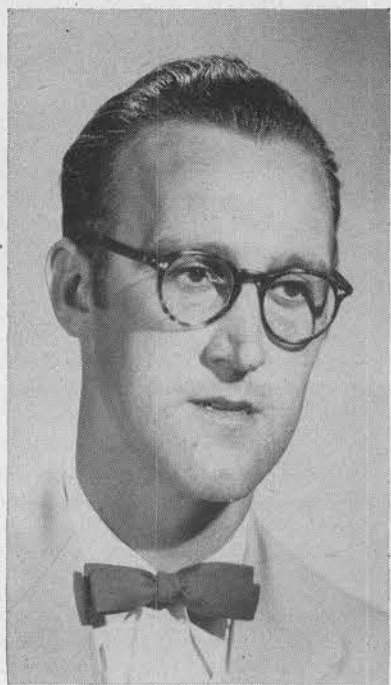

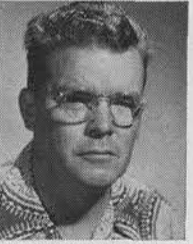

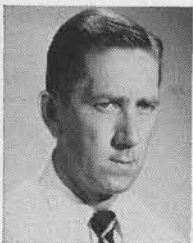
